Fall General Meeting—*Side-by-Side*

The Fall General Meeting will begin with a short business meeting that includes a vote on the new fiscal year budget followed by a presentation a highly successful program, *Great Start* provided by Side-by-Side at Bond Mill Elementary School.

Side by Side is a tax-exempt non-profit organization that was created in 2008 by members of various Laurel churches. They were committed to the idea that the Laurel community-

could and should play a vital role in strengthening our local public schools. Side by Side has come to believe its best way of doing this is to equip parents to help their children succeed in the classroom. Consequently, it has developed the Great Start program, a series of workshop evenings at six elementary schools, including Bond Mill, for pre-kindergarten, kindergarten, first- and second-grade parents. Fall General Meeting—*Side-by-Side*

The parents learn ways to help their children develop strong foundations in behavior, reading and math. To attract as many families as possible, the evenings include a free meal for the entire family, Spanish interpretation and activities for children while the parents are in their workshops.

Last year, almost 1,300 parents and children participated at the six schools (226 at Bond Mill). The program is making a difference: Kindergarten students whose parents participated averaged 35% greater progress on reading scores than students whose par-

ents didn't participate. At Bond Mill, the difference was even greater at 50%.

This year Side by Side will hold 130 parent workshops at the six schools. To accomplish this, it depends on lots of volunteers to check in families, serve the dinner (provided by Side by Side) and lead the children's activities. It is always looking for more volunteers. Outgoing President's Letter

It's the end of September and for the first time in a decade, I'm not scrambling to finalize speakers for the upcoming General meeting. Instead, your new president, Barbara Sollner-Webb is busy with all the day-to-day details. As was announced in the May HOTLINE, I felt it was time. Over the past 10 years, the West Laurel Civic Association has expanded in ever so many ways to try and meet the stated goals of protecting and improving the community and taking active part in civic activities and affairs the West Laurel area. Programs such as Dumpster Day and community-police liaison are now well established and it is good time to turnover the WLCA.

Our most difficult challenge remains how to keep the character of West Laurel while urban sprawl, new and expanded roadways, and crime that accompanies development continue to encroach upon us. As Prince George's, Montgomery, and Howard counties continue to grow, it is increasingly difficult to stand our ground in all the various venues. In this article alone, the Route 198 revisited project may still turn what was a 2-lane country road when I moved here into a 6-lane divided highway even though the ICC was supposed to have put this proposal (the *northern alignment*) to bed. The Montgomery County plan to redevelop the empty Giant complex includes a proposal for 8 to 10 story office buildings and dense condominium development. And Konterra continues to grow filling the space from Beltsville to West Laurel on both sides of I-95. These external threats have the ability to drastically impact the quality of life in West Laurel. I urge you not to be complacent but remain engaged.

As I move off the WLCA Board, I would be remiss if I did not thank the many volunteers starting with our extraordinary board members who are the organizers of Dumpster Day, Senior outreach, community-police liaison, zoning, and traffic issues to name a few. I'd also thank the volunteers from Bond Mill Elementary School, the Cub, Boy, and Girl Scouts, the Recreation Council, countless sports teams, tutors for the Eleanor Roosevelt entrance exams, the Swim Club, and all the other organizations that make this such a wonderful place to live. I know I'm leaving the community in good hands. *Melissa Daston*

GET YOUR HOME READY FOR FALL!

Fall is just around the corner, and the change in season brings not only brilliant fall foliage, but also some much needed chores that will ensure a beautiful yard come Spring and a warm, protected indoors during chilly weather.

HOUSE: Make sure gutters are secure and clean and that there is proper insulation in your attic to prevent snow melting on the roof, pouring into the gutter and refreezing. Inspect your home's foundation and seal entry points to keep small animals from seeking the warmth of the indoors. Seal any cracks. Inside your home, install and/or test smoke- and carbon monoxide detectors. It's a good idea to place a carbon monoxide detector near your furnace. Have your furnace inspected and cleaned before cold weather hits. Locate your water main in the event you need to shut it off in an emergency. Insulate exposed plumbing pipes. Drain air-conditioning pipes. If your AC has a water shut-off valve, turn it off. Use weather stripping around doors and windows to prevent cold air from entering. Switch screens to storm windows around late September.

Chimney: Make sure the cap on the top of your chimney is secure. You really don't want critters climbing down and making your house their home. If the chimney hasn't been cleaned for a while, call a chimney sweep to remove soot and creosote. Buy firewood. Inspect the damper to make sure it opens

and closes properly.

Lawn: Fertilize before the first frost to provide nutrients for the winter months. Aerate for good root development. Keep mowing until it stops growing and can be kept 2 to 2½ inches tall. Over seed your lawn when necessary. If there are bare spots larger than a softball, seed those areas from early September through mid-October. Kill the weeds now to minimize weed growth in the spring. October is a great time to get good weed control going. Once your mowing season is over, drain the gas from the mower, clean the blades and put it in protected storage.

YARD: Early fall is a great time to plant. The soil is still warm enough for roots to grow, but the weather is beginning to cool, so you won't have to water as much. This is also a wonderful time for plant bargains. Now is the time to plant spring flower bulbs and to lift bulbs that cannot overwinter such as dahlias. Trim trees (hiring a professional is a good idea) if branches hang too close to the house or electrical wires. Rake away all debris and edible vegetation away from the foundation. Make sure your snowblower is cleaned, gassed up and ready to go. It's a good idea to track down, dust off and inspect rakes and snow shovels. Replace them if they are worn. Finally, add some glorious fall color to your yard with chrysanthemum, aster, coleus and dianthus.

SHA revives plans for Route 198 & Route 28 Upgrade

On June 17, 2015, Maryland's State Highway Administration (SHA) held a public *workshop* at William Blake High School in Silver Spring, to update citizens on their plans to re-start their "MD Rt. 28/MD Rt. 198 and 28 Corridor Improvement Study". It concerns Rts. 198 and 28 between I-95 and Georgia Avenue. This study was begun over 10 years ago when plans for the ICC were put on hold, to enhance east-west traffic. Then, when it was decided that the ICC would be built, SHA stopped their efforts to expand this closely parallel route along Rts 198 and 28. However, earlier this year SHA re-energized those plans.

At their required public Workshop, many attendees were dubious about the need for such expansion, whether an expanded roadway would draw a lot of east-west commuters and truck drivers who do not wish to pay the ICC tolls, and how the route would negotiate Burtonsville, since its earlier envisioned local bypass road is no longer possible as initially planned.

Attendees were promised that the previous Citizens' Advisory Group for this project (on which West Laurel resident Barbara Sollner-Webb was a member) would be revived, and that after SHA works with these citizen representatives, they would refine plans for three alternative levels of intensity expansion, and then hold another public workshop this fall or winter. Unfortunately, citizens who were to be on this revived Citizens' Advisory Group are still waiting to be contacted, so there appears to be a delay in SHA's plans for this potential major change to our local traffic intensity.

Also early in the summer, SHA also announced a separate project along Rt. 198 that includes the resurfacing/repairing of the Bond Mill intersection, where SHA's curb just in from the *West Laurel* sign that welcomes visitors to our community is in rather deplorable condition. However, attempts to find out about the progress of these plans have not been successful.

Valuable Outings

The Prince George's Chapter of the Sierra Club has organized a series of informative outings that are open to the general public. Tours of the County's landfill, the County's Single-Stream Recycling Center and WSSC's Piscataway Waste Water Treatment Plant were held earlier this fall and were highly informative and well-received by the attendees.

Upcoming tours that also promise to be very interesting are of the County's Yard Waste and Pilot Composting Facility on Friday October 10 and of WSSC's Broad Creek pumping station on Saturday October 18th, both at 10 AM. WSSC will once again be sponsoring deer hunting along the Rocky Gorge Reservoir to reduce the over-abundance of deer. The key dates in our neighborhood are:

- Dustin Road to Aicheson Road: October 29 and November 26
- Howard County directly opposite West Laurel: October 23 and December 18

Beasock's Beat



School is back in session and it's now beginning to get darker earlier. So I want to remind everyone in West Laurel to SLOW DOWN, please!

Unfortunately, the most common request I receive from West Laurel residents is for speed control and speed cameras. There are regular reports about running the stop sign at Sherwood Avenue by the elementary school, passing on Brooklyn Bridge/Riding Stable Road, and high speeds on neighborhood streets. Earlier this year a pedestrian was hit by a car on Kent Road and was hospitalized for several days.

Based on the combination of children walking to school or the school bus stop and this incident, the District VI officers are tracking speed using a speed gun and issuing tickets. Remember the speed limit within the neighborhood streets is 25 mph. Bond Mill Road and Brooklyn Bridge has a primary speed limit of 30 mph with small variations.

The end of the summer we had several incidents of theft from autos in several neighborhoods. So please remember to remove your cell phones and other valuables from your car at night, park in well-lit areas **and** remember to lock your car every night. If you have an alarm, activate it.

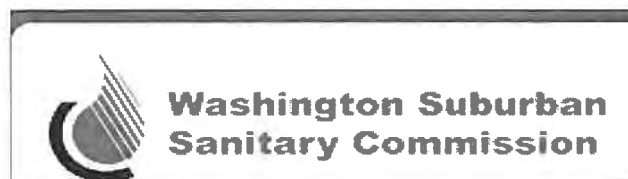

WSSC Planned Rate Changes

On Aug 12, 2014, WSSC held a public hearing on its proposed changes in usage charges. Their rate increase is to average 7.25%, but will make the customer's bill less dependent on "by-the-gallon usage" - so it will increase the most for customers who use the least amount of water.



You may have read about these upcoming rate changes in "The Pipeline" that accompanies your WSSC bill, or see <http://www.wsscwater.com/home/jsp/content/rate-study.faces>. At this meeting, WSSC's General Manager/CEO (Jerry Johnson) and their acting chief financial officer (Chris Cullinan) explained the reason for the new rate structure, including a need to stabilize revenue sources despite decreasing per capita usage, and the fact that WSSC's very aging pipe system is in dire need of increased replacement/rehabilitation/repair.

The WSSC representatives then listened to comments from the public. Regrettably very few of the public attended this meeting. However, West Laurel resident Susan LaCourse was there and expressed concern about the overall large level of rate increase. And Barbara Sollner-Webb expressed concern how the rate changes may be perceived by residential customers when they learn that the total rates for the large commercial customers who use the most water will instead decrease (relative to their previous projections; see <http://www.wsscwater.com/file/Finance/ratestudy/WSSC%20Rate%20Scenario%20Impacts.pdf>). Barbara also suggested possible sources of monetary saving that could be used toward the pipe upgrades, which indeed are very needed.

Fraud and Protecting Seniors Against Scams

In July Riderwood Village, a Senior Living Retirement Community located in Silver Spring, MD hosted their first symposium on preventing fraud against seniors. They had four outside organizations on campus discussing several different hot topics of fraud.

The speakers included; Ralph Vines the Investigative Programs Administrator from the Montgomery County Office of Consumer Protection, the Director of Outreach for the Maryland Chapter of AARP Jennifer Holz, Morton A. Davis Program Coordinator for Keeping Seniors Safe, which is a program that has

been developed in conjunction with the Volunteer Resources Section of the Montgomery County Police Department and lastly Jacqueline Truesdal the Program Manager for the Maryland Senior Medicare Patrol Program.

These speakers covered scams from Medicare fraud to identity theft and everything in between. It's becoming more and more difficult these days to know the difference between what is legitimate and what is a scam. Unfortunately these frauds more often than not target seniors. (continued page 9)
